Background: School Principles for PE and Sport Premium Grant Spend

The government provides additional funding to improve the provision of PE and sport in primary schools. This funding is ring-fenced and must be used to make additional and sustainable improvements—building capacity for future pupils.

At Settrington All Saints C of E Primary School, we believe that PE and sport are essential to children's health, well-being, and achievement. We aim to provide a broad and balanced programme that inspires participation, improves skills, and promotes lifelong fitness.

Our School Strategy 2024–2025

Total PE & Sport Premium Funding Spent: £16,740

We target funding to deliver improvement across the 5 national key indicators:

- 1. Engagement of all pupils in regular physical activity
- 2. Raising the profile of PE and sport as a tool for whole-school improvement
- 3. Increased confidence, knowledge, and skills of staff in teaching PE and sport
- 4. Broader experience of a range of sports and activities offered to all pupils
- 5. Increased participation in competitive sport

Planned Expenditure, Impact & Next Steps

Swimming & Water Safety

As part of the PE and Sport Premium, schools must publish data on Year 6 pupils' swimming attainment.

2024–2025 provision:

During the summer term, all pupils from Year 1 to Year 6 received weekly swimming sessions. This ensured that every child had access to structured water-safety and swimming instruction.

2024-2025 outcomes

88% of Year 6 cohort able to swim competently, confidently, and proficiently over a distance of at least 25 metres.

88% of Year 6 cohort able to use a range of strokes effectively.

100% of Year 6 cohort able to perform safe self-rescue in different water-based situation.

Strategy for 2025–2026:

From September 2025, intensive swimming sessions will run for Years 3 and 4. In addition, any older children who have not yet achieved the national curriculum swimming expectations will continue to receive targeted catch-up provision to ensure they leave primary school confident, safe, and competent swimmers.

Review of Impact

- Engagement: All pupils accessed weekly PE; 48% took part in extra-curricular sports clubs.
- Profile: Sporting success shared in newsletters/assemblies; children inspired to join in.
- Staff Development: £9,560 spent on CPD; staff confidence increased.
- Variety: Pupils accessed opportunities in basketball, hockey, netball, football, rugby, athletics, swimming, dodgeball, rounders.
- Competition: Active participation in School Games; inclusive opportunities for SEND pupils.
- Swimming: All children in Years 1–6 received weekly swimming; targeted catch-up will follow in 2025–26.



Sustainability & Next Steps

- Continue CPD to embed teacher confidence in PE delivery.
- Maintain investment in equipment and active travel initiatives.
- Strengthen competitive sport opportunities with local schools.
- Ensure all pupils, including SEND and disadvantaged, have equal access to provision.
- Sustain intensive swimming for Years 3 and 4 and catch-up lessons for older pupils.
